Orlando, FL... March 20, 2024 - The Institute for Diversity and Ethics in Sport (TIDES) at the University of Central Florida (UCF) released its annual study, **“Keeping Score When It Counts: Academic Progress/Graduation Success Rate Study of the 2024 NCAA Division I Men’s and Women’s Basketball Tournament Teams.”** This study provides the most comprehensive analysis of the academic performance of student-athletes on teams selected for the 2024 NCAA Division I Men’s and Women’s Basketball Tournaments. The study examined the Graduation Success Rates (GSR) and Academic Progress Rates (APR) as reported by the NCAA for the men’s and women’s tournament teams. This study also compared the graduation rate data of white and Black male and female basketball student-athletes. Finally, it compares graduation rates and academic progress rates for Division I teams that had been selected for the men’s and women’s brackets of the 2024 NCAA Basketball Tournaments.


The 2024 NCAA Men’s Basketball Championship will be staged in Glendale, Arizona while the women’s championship will tip off in Cleveland, Ohio.

The 2024 report shows that women graduated at an average rate of **96.0** percent. There was only one women's team this year that fell below the **930** APR benchmark, scoring a **926**. White female student-athletes graduated at a rate of **2.7** percentage points higher than Black female student-athletes (**97.7** percent compared to **95.0** percent).

No institutions had a women's team with a GSR below 60 percent in 2024 with 77 percent being the lowest.

The men graduated at an average rate of **84.0** percent, decreasing **0.9** percentage points from last year. There were three men's teams this year that fell below the **930** APR benchmark: Long Beach State University with a **913**, Howard University with a **924**, and Texas Christian University with a **924**. Stetson University, University of Oregon, University of Texas at Austin, University of Arizona, and Long Beach State University were the only men's teams with a GSR below **60** percent. Last year, two institutions fell below this mark.


Annually reported, the gap between the graduation rates for white and Black student-athletes, especially among the men's teams, was the most troubling statistic in the report last year. However, this year, the gap between the graduation rate for white (**89.7** percent) and Black male student-athletes (**84.2** percent) showed dramatic improvement, shrinking from **14** percent in 2023 to **5.5** percent in 2024. Unfortunately, the main driver for the diminished gap was the graduation rate for white male student-athletes dropping by **5.7** percentage points, going from **95.4** percent in 2023 to **89.7** percent in 2024.

The gap between white (**97.8** percent) and Black women student-athletes (**95.0** percent) also shrank, going from **6.3** percent in 2023 to **2.8** percent in 2024.

This year, South Dakota State University was the only school to be selected for both the men's and women's tournaments and have both teams achieve a **100** percent graduation rate.

Adrien Bouchet, the Director of TIDES, stated, "Student-athletes on women's basketball teams have once again set the academic standard when it comes to academics across the college basketball landscape." Fifty-two years after the passage of Title IX, women who are student-athletes have historically performed much better academically than the men. We have been doing the graduation rate studies for two decades. Over that period of time, we have reported that women's basketball teams have performed considerably better in the classroom than the men's teams in all of the categories we measure. Of the women's teams, **20** scored a perfect APR score of **1000** while **five** men's teams achieved a perfect score.

There were **42** women's teams and **16** men's teams with a **100** percent graduation rate."

In 2024, **67** of the **68** women's teams graduated at least **80** percent of their basketball student-athletes. Only the University of California, Irvine, which graduated **77.0** percent, fell below this mark. Last year, **64** of the **68** women's teams graduated at least **80** percent of their basketball student-athletes.

It was totally unacceptable that **five** men's teams (**7.3** percent) had a **30.0** percentage point or greater gap between the graduation rates of their white and Black basketball student-athletes.

On the women's side, **two** teams (**5.9** percent) had a **30.0** percentage point or greater gap between the graduation rates of white and Black basketball student-athletes.

All **68** (**100** percent) women's teams, compared to **55** (**80.9** percent) of the men's teams, graduated at least **70** percent of their student-athletes, creating a **19.1** percentage point gap between the women and the men.

Based on Graduation Success Rate data, additional highlights from the study include the following:

70 percent graduation rates

- **95.1** percent (**58** teams) of the women's tournament teams graduated **70** percent or more of their white basketball student-athletes, while **96.9** percent (**62** teams) graduated **70** percent or more of their Black basketball student-athletes. This resulted in a **1.8** percentage point gap in favor of the Black basketball student-athletes.
- Among the men's teams, **83.0** percent (**39** teams) of the men's tournament teams graduated **70** percent or more of their white basketball student-athletes, while only **77.9** percent (**53** teams) graduated **70** percent or more of their Black basketball student-athletes, resulting in a **5.1** percentage point gap among the men's teams in favor of the white student-athletes.

60 percent graduation rates

- **98.4** percent (**60** teams) of women's tournament teams graduated **60** percent or more of their white basketball student-athletes. Additionally, **98.4** percent (**63** teams) of the women's tournament teams graduated **60** percent or more of both their Black basketball student-athletes. So, from a percentage standpoint, both white and Black student-athletes were equal.
- Among the men's tournament teams, **91.5** percent (**43** teams) graduated **60** percent or more of their white basketball student-athletes, while **88.2** percent (**60** teams) graduated **60** percent or more of their Black basketball student-athletes. This resulted in a **3.3** percentage point gap in favor of the white basketball student-athletes.

50 percent graduation rates

- Among women's tournament teams, **100** percent (**61** teams) graduated at least **50** percent or more of their white student-athletes. Additionally, **100** percent (**64** teams) of women's tournament teams graduated at least **50** percent or more of their Black student-athletes.
- This year, **95.7** percent (**45** teams) of the men's tournament teams graduated **50** percent or more of their white basketball student-athletes, while **97.1** percent (**66** teams) graduated **50** percent or more of their Black basketball student-athletes. This resulted in a **1.4** percentage point gap among the men in favor of the Black basketball student-athletes.

There were **42** women's teams that achieved **100** percent graduation success rates: University of Notre Dame, University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, North Carolina State University, Syracuse University, University of Louisville, Rice University, Florida Gulf Coast University, Iowa State University, Baylor University, West Virginia University, University of Oklahoma, University of Connecticut, Creighton University, Eastern Washington University, Presbyterian College, University of Michigan, Indiana University, Bloomington, University of Nebraska-Lincoln, University of Maryland, College Park, University of Maryland, College Park,

Drexel University, University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, Columbia University-Barnard College, Princeton University, Fairfield University, Kent State University, Drake University, Sacred Heart University, University of Southern California, University of Arizona, University of Utah, University of California, Los Angeles, University of Colorado, Boulder, Stanford University, College of the Holy Cross, Vanderbilt University, Auburn University, Texas A&M University, College Station, Louisiana State University, University of Tennessee, Knoxville, University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, South Dakota State University and Marshall University.

There were **16** men's teams that achieved **100** percent graduation success rates: Clemson University, University of Vermont, University of Alabama at Birmingham, Duquesne University, Northwestern University, Yale University, Saint Peter's University, Howard University, Washington State University, University of Alabama, University of Florida, Mississippi State University, University of Kentucky, Samford University, South Dakota State University and Saint Mary's College of California.

Bouchet added, "There were **20** teams within the women's basketball tournament field and **five** in the men's field that achieved a perfect APR score of **1000**. This year, **three** men's teams and **one** women's team fell below the **930** mark. This is a regression from last year, which had no teams in either tournament fall below the **930** mark. We must continue to improve expectations nationwide so there can be more years like 2023. The same can be said for GSR standards. Last year, in his final TIDES report on this subject, former TIDES director Dr. Richard Lapchick said that GSR standards should be increased to at least **60** percent. Currently, just as they did last year, **100** percent of the women's teams are above this standard. However, only **92.6** percent of men's teams are above this standard, a regression from the **97.1** percent that were above it last year."

The APR, developed in 2004, is a four-year average of academic performance that rewards student-athletes for remaining eligible as well as continuing their education at the same school. The NCAA voted to institute stricter policies with regard to postseason athletic participation by raising the score from **925** to **930**, equivalent to a **50** percent graduation rate, to qualify for postseason

participation the following year. The current system provides that teams scoring below a **930** APR can lose up to 10 percent of their scholarships. Teams can also be subject to historical penalties for poor academic performance over time.

APR penalties and access to competition are not currently in effect. In October 2020, in response to the pandemic, the Division I Board of Directors suspended penalties and loss of postseason access associated with the Academic Progress Rate. This suspension remained in effect during the 2022-23 season as well. Penalties are expected to return for the 2024-25 season, pending an official announcement in Spring 2024.

The APR data of the teams in the study is based on data submitted by the institutions for the 2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21 and 2021-22 academic years. This is the most updated data available on the NCAA website and provided by the NCAA.

Tournament Leaders Based on Academics

We would like to highlight schools that are putting an emphasis on education on and off the court. Below we have created our own Sweet 16, Elite Eight, and Final Four based on GSR and APR. In our men's bracket, the University of Alabama ranked the highest with a GSR of **100** and an APR of **1000**. Also reaching our Final Four were Yale University (APR: **995**, GSR: **100**), Northwestern University (APR: **991**, GSR: **100**), and the University of Vermont (APR: **991**, GSR: **100**). In our women's bracket, we were unable to proceed past the Sweet 16 because the top nine schools, Columbia University-Barnard College, Creighton University, Kent State University, North Carolina State University, Rice University, South Dakota State University, University of Connecticut, University of Louisville, and the University of Michigan, each had GSRs of **100**, and APRs of **1000**.

Note on the brackets:

Due to an absence of data on the racial identity of a team's head coach, the criteria for the brackets' reseeding was changed for this year.

Notes on the women's teams:

1. In the women's bracket, the College of the Holy Cross, Drake University, Princeton University, and the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay had no reported Black basketball student-athletes eligible to graduate in the period recorded.
2. In the women's bracket, the following **seven** teams had no reported white basketball student-athletes eligible to graduate in the period recorded: Norfolk State University, The Ohio State University, University of South Carolina, Columbia University-Barnard College, Jackson State University, Louisiana State University, University of Arizona, and Princeton University.

Notes on the men's teams:

1. In the men's bracket, all **68** teams had Black basketball student-athletes eligible to graduate in the period recorded.
2. In the men's bracket, the following **21** teams had no reported white basketball student-athletes eligible to graduate in the period recorded: Wagner College, Morehead State University, University of Arizona, Auburn University, University of South Carolina-Columbia, University of Florida, Mississippi State University, McNeese State University, North Carolina State University, Stetson University, Duquesne University, Texas Christian University, Texas Tech University, University of Connecticut, Longwood University, Long Beach State University, Saint Peter's University, Howard University, University of Nevada-Reno, San Diego State University and the University of Houston.

In both the men's and women's brackets, there were teams that either had no white or no Black student basketball student-athletes eligible to graduate in the period recorded. All the team comparisons took that into account. Overall, the rates were based on **68** men's and women's teams, the **64** teams that will make the NCAA Tournament as well as the **four** teams that played in the play-in games to qualify for the tournament.

Rates for Black student-athletes on the women's teams were based on **64** teams due to **four** schools having no reported Black basketball student-athletes eligible to graduate in the period recorded. Rates for white female student-athletes were based on **61** teams due to **seven** teams having no reported white basketball student-athletes eligible to graduate in the period recorded.

On the men's side rates for Black student-athletes were based on all **68** teams. Rates for white student-athletes were based on **47** teams due to **21** teams having no reported white basketball student-athletes eligible to graduate in the period recorded.

Methodology

The GSR was developed in 2005 in response to the demand for a more accurate measure of graduation performance of NCAA athletics programs. The GSR is used by the NCAA as a measuring device to signal the performance of NCAA athletic programs while the APR is used to determine penalties for academically underperforming athletic programs.

NCAA statistics were used in this study. The Institute reviewed Graduation Success Rate data reported by the NCAA for each member institution and their teams in the men's and women's tournaments. The Graduation Success Rate reflects graduation within six years for a four-class average (freshmen classes of 2013-14, 2014-15, 2015-16 and 2016-17). The Institute used this data to calculate the differences in graduation success rates between Black and white basketball student-athletes and between basketball student-athletes and all NCAA athletes on each campus.

The Institute for Diversity and Ethics In Sport (TIDES)

The Institute for Diversity and Ethics in Sport ("TIDES" or the "Institute") serves as a comprehensive resource for issues related to gender and race in amateur, collegiate, and professional sport. The Institute researches and publishes a variety of studies, including annual studies of student-athlete graduation rates and racial attitudes in sport, as well as the internationally recognized Racial and Gender Report Card, an assessment of hiring practices in professional and college sport. The Institute also monitors some of the critical ethical issues in college and professional sport, including the potential for exploitation of student-athletes, gambling, performance-enhancing drugs, and violence in sport.

All APR/GSR data is currently available from the NCAA national office's research department. This data was collected by the research team at The Institute for Diversity and Ethics in Sport at the University of Central Florida's DeVos Sport Business Management Program. The data was placed into spreadsheets and compared against data from previous years within the guidelines of the study. After evaluating the data, the report text was drafted; it references changes in statistics from previous years.
